Topic: The Cognitive Benefits of Bilingualism

Today's lecture examines cognitive effects of speaking two languages. Bialystok's 2004 study found bilingual children outperformed monolinguals on selective attention and inhibitory control – components of executive function. Bilingual speakers manage two active language systems, strengthening cognitive control. Some studies suggest bilingualism may delay Alzheimer's onset by an average of 4-5 years. Trade-off: smaller vocabulary per individual language, though combined vocabulary exceeds monolinguals. fMRI evidence shows increased grey matter in the left inferior parietal cortex.

Passage 1 – The Surprising Science of Colour Perception

- A.** Colour is often thought of as an objective property of the physical world. In reality, what we perceive as colour is a sophisticated construction of the brain, influenced not only by wavelengths of light, but by context, culture, memory, and even language.
- B.** The human eye contains approximately 6 million cone cells, clustered in a small central area of the retina called the fovea. These cones are sensitive to three broad wavelength ranges, corresponding roughly to red, green, and blue light. All colour vision arises from the brain's interpretation of signals from these three cell types – the basis of trichromatic colour theory, first proposed by Thomas Young in 1802 and later expanded by Hermann von Helmholtz.
- C.** One of the most dramatic demonstrations that colour perception is a mental construction is the phenomenon of colour constancy. A red apple looks red both in bright sunlight and under the dim glow of an incandescent lamp, even though the wavelengths reflected are very different. The brain compensates automatically for changes in illumination, using contextual information to maintain stable perception.
- D.** Language provides another window into the constructed nature of colour. Research by Lera Boroditsky has shown that people are faster at distinguishing colours that lie on opposite sides of a linguistic boundary. Russian speakers, who use distinct words for light blue (goluboy) and dark blue (siniy), show faster discrimination than English speakers, for whom both are simply 'blue'.
- E.** Mantis shrimps have up to sixteen types of photoreceptors versus the human three, yet paradoxically perform worse on colour discrimination tasks. This counter-intuitive finding suggests that having more receptor types does not translate into richer colour experience – the mantis shrimp's system may be optimised for rapid identification rather than fine discrimination.
- F.** The viral sensation of 'the dress' in 2015 – in which some viewers saw blue-and-black while others saw white-and-gold – brought colour perception into popular culture. Researchers identified that disagreement arose from different unconscious assumptions about lighting conditions, highlighting how powerfully prior assumptions can override raw sensory input.

Passage 2 – The Changing Economics of the Music Industry

- A.** The music industry has undergone more structural transformation in the past two decades than in the entire preceding century. The digital revolution eliminated the physical album as the primary revenue source, forcing labels, artists, and distributors to rebuild their business models from the ground up.
- B.** At its peak in 1999, global recorded music revenues exceeded \$27 billion. By 2014, that figure had fallen to around \$14 billion – a decline driven not merely by piracy, but by a fundamental change in how consumers valued ownership of recorded music.
- C.** Streaming services, led by Spotify which launched in 2008, initially attracted scepticism. The per-stream payment model – typically a fraction of a cent – seemed incompatible with sustainable artist income. However, streaming's ability to generate continuous revenue gradually won over label executives, and the format now dominates global consumption.
- D.** The economic consequences for working musicians have been uneven. Established artists benefit disproportionately, as algorithms direct listeners toward familiar names. Independent artists find it increasingly difficult to generate income from recordings alone – accelerating a shift toward live performance as the primary income source.
- E.** Paradoxically, the most commercially successful era in live music history coincides with the digital disruption of recorded music. Global concert revenues exceeded \$30 billion in 2019, compared to under \$10 billion in the late 1990s. The experience economy has benefited the live music sector enormously.

Passage 3 – Rewilding: Restoring Ecological Balance

- A.** Rewilding – the large-scale restoration of ecosystems – has emerged as one of the most ambitious conservation strategies of the twenty-first century. Proponents argue it represents a departure from conventional conservation, which has focused on managing existing habitats. Rewilding aims to reduce human intervention and restore self-sustaining, biodiverse ecosystems.
- B.** The concept gained credibility following research by Soulé and Noss in the 1990s, who emphasised three interconnected elements: cores (large protected areas), corridors (connecting habitat strips), and carnivores. Apex predator reintroduction is central to many projects – top predators create 'trophic cascades' that transform entire ecosystems. The reintroduction of wolves to Yellowstone National Park in 1995 is frequently cited as the defining case study.
- C.** The Yellowstone experiment is credited with reshaping the park's ecology. Wolf predation reduced overgrazing by elk, allowing riverside vegetation to recover and stabilising riverbanks – a phenomenon described as a 'landscape of fear.' Critics caution against over-relying on a single case study, noting that results may not transfer to other ecosystems.
- D.** In Europe, rewilding has faced different challenges. Population densities and land ownership patterns mean large contiguous areas are rarely available. The Rewilding Europe initiative focuses on acquiring marginal agricultural land, particularly in Eastern Europe where depopulation has left areas underutilised. The project aims to restore one million hectares by 2030.
- E.** Opposition frequently comes from farming communities who fear the economic consequences of predator reintroduction. In Scotland, proposals to reintroduce lynx have generated fierce debate. Farmers warn of livestock losses; advocates counter that compensation schemes and evidence from Norway – where lynx coexist with sheep farming – show integration is achievable.
